Brown's Bill Expanding Maternal Health Care Approved by Committee

Article by Senator Rosemary Brown

I am pleased to share that my legislation, Senate Bill 507, which would establish a certified midwife license in Pennsylvania, was recently approved by the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. This marks an important step forward in addressing gaps in maternal health care across our Commonwealth.

This bill introduces a new certification for midwives, allowing them to practice independently under specific conditions. It also outlines the necessary educational requirements and clarifies when certified

midwives may prescribe medications, including controlled substances.

Certified midwives play a vital role in women's health. They not only provide care during pregnancy, childbirth, and postpartum, but also offer routine reproductive care such as prenatal services, clinical MATERNAL cont'd on pg 2

examinations, ings, and education for new mothers. In many cases, midwives are on the front lines, identifying high-risk pregnancies and supporting women throughout their journey into motherhood.

Unfortunately, many counties in Pennsylvania face severe shortages of OB-GYNs and licensed midwives. These shortages leave families without adequate care receive the high-quality and place unnecessary



strain on the providers we do have. By creating a pathway for certified midwives to practice, we can expand access to maternal health care and ensure women and families care they deserve.

Senate Bill 507 has received bipartisan support and now advances to the full Senate for consideration. I look forward to continuing this work to strengthen maternal health care access for all Pennsylvanians.

Northampton County Lawmakers Set the Record Straight on Budget Dispute with **County Executive McClure**

Ann Reps. (R-Northampton), Zach Mako (R-Lehigh/ Northampton) and Milou Mackenzie (R-Lehigh/ Northampton/Montgomery) today sent a letter to Northampton County Executive Lamont Mc-Clure correcting statements about Pennsylvania's budget impasse.

The lawmakers pushed back against claims that Senate Republicans are responsible for the impasse, noting the Senate passed a stopgap budget on Aug. 12 to negotiations continued. Less than 24 hours later, House Democrats voted it down.

"We urge you to stop playing politics with people's lives. Canceling events and sending letters intended to alarm constituents is not good government," the letter

The letter also disputes a Sept. 19 letter from the county's Department of Human Services, noting multiple inaccuracies and the omission of the

Flood release funding while stopgap budget. The lawmakers emphasized that 911 centers will not lose funding and encouraged McClure to urge House Democratic leadership and Speaker Joanna Mc-Clinton to convene the House to pass at least a stopgap budget and restore county program funding.



Kean, Amo Reintroduce Bill to Improve Artificial Intelligence Literacy for K-12 in New Jersey



Reps. Tom Kean, Jr. (NJ-07) and Gabe Amo (RI-01), reintroduced the Literacy in Future Technologies (LIFT) Artificial Intelligence Act, bipartisan legislation to improve artificial intelligence literacy for K-12.





Murphy Administration Cuts Ribbon On Dr. James Still Office Historic Site And Unveils Black Heritage Trail Marker After \$1.75 Million Restoration

The New Jersey Department of State and Department of Environmental Protection today held a ribbon-cutting ceremony and unveiled a New Jersey Black Heritage Trail marker at the Dr. James Still Office Historic Site in Medford, Burlington County, the State Park Service's first African American historic site, following a nearly \$1.75 million, multi-year stabilization and restoration project.

Historically referred to as the "Black Doctor of the Pines," Dr. James Still was a self-taught physician who diagnosed and treated patients at his office in Medford, where he developed and dispensed herbal and holistic remedies. As part of today's ribbon-cutting, the New Jersey Historical Commission also unveiled a New Jersey Black Heritage Trail marker to designate the site as part of a trail-like path that connects the stories of Black life and resiliency.

"The New Jersey Black Heritage Trail shares the stories of New Jersey's African American communities dating back more than 300 years," said Lieutenant Governor Tahesha Way, who oversees the New Jersey Historical Commission in her role as Secretary of State. "Given the Trail's commitment to uplifting Black resiliency and joy, it is only fitting to have a marker on this Trail discussing the life and legacy of Dr. James Still."

"We are honored to announce the completion of the years-long restoration work that preserves African American history in our state," Environmental Protection Commission-

er Shawn M. LaTourette said. "Dr. James Still's life story of perseverance, and his unwavering determination to help others, serves as an inspiration for us all."

The non-profit Dr. James Still Historic Office Site Association, an Officially Recognized Friends Organization of the DEP's State Park Service, assists the state with interpreting and maintaining the historic site.

"Members of the Dr. James Still Historic Office Site Association are delighted to achieve this milestone accomplishment in our overall mission of honoring Dr. James Still's life and legacy," said Carol Marshall-Douglas, President of the Dr. James Still Historic Office Site Association and Dr. Still's third great- grandniece. words of Dr. James Still. ... in all our dealings, let truth be our guiding star.' Dr. James Still's legacy continues to be our guiding star as we strive to ensure that Dr. James Still's enduring story continues to uplift and empower future generations."

"The restoration of the Dr. James Still Office Historic Site reflects our commitment to preserving New Jersey's diverse history while making it accessible to all," said John Cecil, Assistant Commissioner for State Parks, Forests & Historic Sites. "Visitors to the site will experience Dr. Still's office much as it appeared in 1855, all while learning from his remarkable legacy as a man who overcame extraordinary challenges to become a doctor and one of the largest landowners and wealthiest individuals in Burlington County at the time."

Work began in 2019 to stabilize the structure and restore the historic office to reflect its original design. Those activities in-

-Removal of non-original additions and materi-

-Repointing and raking of the foundation brick-

-Replacement of siding with original materials

-Painting the building in its historic color -Restoration of windows

and doors, and repairs to eaves and soffits -Replacement of asphalt

shingles with period-appropriate cedar

-Reconstruction of the office's front porch to reflect the original 1855 design

inal flooring, repainting plaster walls, and reinforcing structural floor joists

-Electrical upgrades, including LED track lighting for future interpretive displays.

Other improvements to the historic site include accessible parking and an accessibility ramp leading to the office's entrance. Along the ramp are herbal plantings representative of those that Dr. Still used for his practice and donated by the Dr. James Still Historic Office Site Association.

DEP purchased the Dr. James Still Office Historic Site in 2006 with Green Acres funds. Since then, additional adjacent parcels of land have been acquired by the DEP State Park Service, bringing the site's total size to 22 acres. Plans are underway to

add interpretive exhibits inside the restored building to educate visitors about Dr. Still's legacy. In 2024, the New Jersey Historical Commission awarded \$20,000 to the Dr. James Still Historic Office Site Association to produce an interpretive plan for the historic site. The interpretive plan will illuminate the many stories of Dr. James Still's life and will serve as the foundation for developing the site's docent manual, ensuring consistency among guided tours.

"With the restoration of Dr. Still's historic office complete, we are excited to bring this unique site to life through new exhibits and guided tours," said Mark Texel, Administrator for State Historic -Restoration of the orig- site allows us to share html

the powerful story of Dr. Still's life and contributions, while expanding representation of African American history within New Jersey's state historic sites and parks system."

Free tours of the property are led by the Dr. James Still Historic Office Site Association every first and third Sunday of the month from 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. The site also features a visitor and education center operated by the Association. More information is available at drjamesstillcenter.org.

The New Jersey Black Heritage Trail was established through legislation Governor Murphy signed into law on Sept. 7, 2022, to highlight Black heritage sites through historical markers and a trail-like path that connects the stories of Black life and resiliency. The New Jersey Historical Commission leads the effort and works in cooperation with other state agencies, such as the Historic Preservation Office, the Division of Travel and Tourism, and the New Jersey Black Heritage Foundation, as well as local governments, owners or operators of Black heritage sites to identify sites for the trail.

Since 2022, 61 nominated sites have been proposed for the New Jersey Black Heritage Trail. A list of official New Jersey Black Heritage Trail sites may be found at nj.gov/ state/historical/his-blackheritage-trail-all-approved-sites.shtml.

"It was a joy to work with our colleagues at the Department of Environmental Protection on this project," said Sara Cureton, Executive Director of the New Jersey Historical Commission. "We hope that the addition of a New Jersey Black Heritage Trail marker will raise awareness of Dr. Still's legacy and attract visitors to his historic office."

Garden Dilemmas? Ask Mary!

Hello fellow readers, What a delight to revisit Liberty Farm's Sussex County Sunflower Maze in Sandyston, NJ. Raj Sinha, kindly offered a tour of the maze to those who benefit from the Mental Health Association in Newton, New Jersey. The agency supports families and friends of individuals with mental illness and offers early intervention support services.

It's their 16th year of the maze. Raj started growing sunflowers when the New Jersey Audubon Society wanted locally grown sunflower seeds. People were interested in the

50-acre field, so he decided to create an opportunity for folks to interact with the sunflowers "close and in person" and made the amazing maze.

"People travel from all over to visit, some coming right from the airport," Raj said. Many come to the maze for special occasions, to make milestone announcements, and to take photographs. Liberty Farm's Sussex County Sunflower Maze also hosts weddings and other events.

There's no question that the smiling faces of sunflowers bring happiness.

Of course, I had to share the story of the sunflowers I grew from seed in the vegetable garden that my dear old grandpa, who lived with us in his last years, had hand-dug. That is what I told Grandpa—How



ver my comeback was, even as a kid.


Sunflowers, native to North America, are a feast for pollinators. Each sunflower has up to 2 thousand florets filled with nectar, making them a lure for bees and other insects. Sunflowers can also help heal contaminated land, as they are hyperaccumulators, meaning they can absorb metal and radiation toxins. After Fukushima and Chornobyl, as part of the remediation process, millions of sunflowers were planted to absorb the toxins. And fields of them are grown to restore land contaminated with lead.

It felt like a homecoming to visit the sunflower maze and see



my counselor and other client friends from the Mental Health Association. While I am no longer accessing their free counseling services, the help received in understanding and learning ways to help navigate life with loved ones with mental illness continues to help me—such a joy to remain connected.

The visit came with a special treat of chatting with Raj's son, who self-published a book titled Jill the Chick; his pen name is Zy Saturnees. He was busy making bouquets of sunflowers and zinnias for patrons of their farmstand. His face lit up when I asked if he'd sign a copy of his book on sale there.



Indeed, it's a charming story, and I adore Zy's acknowledgments, thanking his parents for always being there for him as well as other family members and friends who helped him with the book, along with dedicated fans who support and believe in him.
