Construction Update on East Stroudsburg Exit 308 on I-80



From PA Senator Rosemary Brown:

As we all know, there has been ongoing work at Exit 308 along I-80 in East Stroudsburg for an extended period of time now. I want to share some important updates on this project:

When I-80 was first built in the Stroudsburg area in 1970 as part of the Eisenhower Interstate System, the standards for on and off-ramps were much shorter than what is required today. Over the years, this has created safety concerns for drivers, particularly during heavy traffic periis designed to address these issues by widening and lengthening the ramps, improving traffic flow, and making the interchange safer.

In addition to safer, wider lanes and improved lighting, there will be two new stone-finished roundabouts that greet travelers with a "Welcome to East Stroudsburg" sign. I-80 itself will be widened to three lanes, and Prospect Street and Brown Street by Lehigh Valley Hospital-Pocono will be expanded to help traffic flow more smoothly to the hospital and East ods. Northampton County Sheriff's Department Warns of Ongoing Scams

The Northampton County Sheriff's Department is alerting the public to a scam currently targeting community members.

The department has received multiple reports from residents stating they were contacted by phone, text, or other forms of communication, instructing them on how to post bond to avoid incarceration. In some cases, fraudulent flyers featuring the Sheriff's Department emblem and designed to appear authentic have been distributed. These communications vide directions on how and where to deposit a cash bond using a local kiosk.

This is a scam.

Northampton The County Sheriff's Department does not:

Accept cash or credit card information for bail purposes

Instruct individuals to use kiosks, online transfers, or other third-par-



ty methods for bail Solicit personal financial information by phone, text, or email

Residents who believe they may have been victimized are urged to:

Contact their local police department immediately.

Report the scam to the Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office. 1-800-441-2555 or by emailing scams@attorneygeneral.gov.

Northampton County urges all residents to remain vigilant and cautious. When in doubt, verify through official channels before providing any personal or financial information.

Community Reminder on Pennsylvania's School Bus | Local Postal Worker Honored Safety and the Laws Surrounding Them

Parents of school ages students, please take a moment to review the following safety tips to help ensure our children arrive to and from school safely each day:

- Get to the school bus stop five minutes early so you won't have to run across the road to catch
- When waiting for the bus, stay away from traffic. Line up at least five giant steps away from the curb or the roadway to wait for the bus.
- Never run after the school bus if it has already left the bus stop.
- Never push when getting on or off of the school bus.
- Always walk at least 10 feet in front of the bus when crossing so that the school bus driver can see
- Be aware Cross with Care! Wait until the school bus has stopped all traffic before stepping out onto the road.
- When the school bus is moving, always stay in your seat. Never put your head, arms or hands out of the window.
- Talk quietly; do not distract your school bus driver.
- If your school bus crosses railroad tracks, be calm and quiet so that your driver can listen for a train. Always obey your school bus driver's instructions, so that he or she can make safe deci-
- Never play with the emergency exits. Backpacks, band instruments, or sports equipment may not block the aisle or



emergency exits. If there is an emergency, listen to the driver and follow instructions.

- When getting off of the school bus, make sure that all drawstrings and other loose objects are secure so that they don't get caught on the handrail or the door.
- Never cross the street behind the school bus.
- If you leave something on the bus or drop something outside of the bus, never go back for it. The driver may not see you and begin moving the
- Never speak to strangers at the bus stop and never get into the car with a stranger.
- Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law:
- Motorists must stop at least 10 feet away from school buses that have their red lights flashing and stop arm activated.
- Motorists must stop when they are behind a bus, meeting the bus or approaching an intersection where a bus is stopped.

- Motorists following or traveling alongside a school bus must also stop until the red lights have stopped flashing, the stop arm is withdrawn, and all children have reached safety.
- If physical barriers such as grassy medians, guide rails or concrete median barriers separate oncoming traffic from the bus, motorists in the opposing lanes may proceed without stopping.
- Do not proceed until all the children have reached a place of safety. Penalties: There are two distinct programs related to violations of Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law.
- Criminal violations: 75 Pa. C.S. § 3345.0(opens in a new tab) (Meeting or overtaking school bus) identifies fines and penalties when a police officer pulls you over for a violation, including:
- \$250 fine and a \$35 surcharge to be deposited into the School Bus Safety Grant Program Account.

- Five points on your

driving record. - 60-day license suspen-

- Civil violations: 75 Pa. C.S. § 3345.1(opens in a new tab) (Automated enforcement of failure to stop for school bus with flashing red lights) allows school entities to install and operate a side stop signal arm enforcement system for the purpose of enforcing the School Bus Stopping Law. Civil violations include only a \$300 fine and don't reflect any points or insurance ratings.

Stroudsburg University. Fifty-seven percent of the project will be completed by Labor Day. Major progress includes replacing and upgrading water, sewer, communication, and electric utilities; installing 10,000 feet of new drainage pipes; removing the old Prospect Street bridge and completing Phase 1 of the new one; and building retaining and

sound walls along the eastbound lanes.

Still to come are the final widening of Prospect Street and completion of the new bridge, the construction of the roundabouts, the widening of both east and westbound lanes, and the permanent alignment of the new on and off-ramps. Additional retaining walls on both sides of the highway will also be completed.

The project remains on schedule and is anticipated to be completed by late 2027.

Registration Opens September 4th for Household Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Event

Registration for the 2025 Household Hazardous Waste Drop-off event will open Thursday, September 4th at 8:00 a.m. This event is only for Northampton County residents; online pre-registration is required. County residents may sign up for one appointment per household. Sign-ups are on a first-come, first-served basis. Registration often reaches capacity quickly, so residents are encouraged to register promptly and open an account with Eventbrite (www. eventbrite.com) before registration begins. A link to the event will be posted on the Northampton County Homepage.

The Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event will be held on Saturday, October 4 at Northampton Community College (3835 Green Pond Road, Bethlehem) and will be held rain or shine. For the safety of staff, you must enter from the campus's Main Entrance on Green Pond Road.

Appointment times are in 15-minute increments. User instructions are available on the County's Environmental Services webpage. After successfully registering, a confirmation email will be sent by Eventbrite



with a printable ticket attachment. If you need to change your confirmed time, you must delete or cancel your appointment on Eventbrite and re-register. There is no guarantee that an appointment will remain available if you cancel. Those who show up without an appointment will be turned away.

Acceptable waste must be generated in the home and not affiliated with any commercial business, contractor, nonprofit, organization, institution, or out-ofcounty residence. Staff has the right to determine and refuse unauthorized material. Commercially registered vehicles, including rentals, are not permitted.

To be admitted to the event, each participant must:

- Show a printed ticket from Eventbrite or display the confirmation email on their smart phone
- Show proof of residency matching the contact information used for registration
- Arrive within their scheduled timeframe, not before or after
- Only drop off accepted materials
- Only 50 gallons and 90 pounds of solid waste will be accepted per vehicle.

This is a no-contact event, which means drivers must remain inside their vehicles upon arrival. Material must be accessible from the trunk, cargo area, or bed of a truck. Event staff will remove all items from those locations.

Acceptable materials include paint products, automotive fluids, outdoor products (pesticides, herbicides, driveway sealers, pool chemicals, etc.), and household products (lead acid car batteries, rechargeable, lithium or button type household batteries, fire extinguishers, flammables, adhesives, aerosols, etc.)

Unacceptable materials include electronics, appliances, Freon, scrap metal, explosives, amradioactive munition, waste, fireworks, smoke/ carbon monoxide protectors, medical waste, sharps, latex paint, alkaline and electric vehicle batteries, gas cylinders and helium tanks. Garden Dilemmas? Ask Mary!

Hello, fellow readers,

I look forward to sharing an update on a long-ago story about a real softie, a softwooded Sweet Autumn Clematis, in its glory this time of year. With a plethora of tiny white blooms from August to September, she resembles a snowdrift and smells heavenly. I love the fragrance brought in by the cooler evening breeze as I snag the last of the summer season's porch campouts on the futon. And adore waking to the busy hums of what I think are bumblebees with fuzzy yellow backs and black bodies, though they seem smaller than the common Eastern Bumble Bee (Bombus impatiens).

Unlike Wisteria or Trumpet Vines, which folks start out loving until the strength of the woody climbers destroys their deck or whelming their beds. pergola, Sweet Autumn And Sweet Autumn Clematis's soft, woody nature won't harm rails or screens, for that matter. Plus, she blooms on new wood, so you can as where it can be easily manage her size without missing out on glorious blooms.

Once the flowers fade, a silvery blanket

contrasting beautifully with the dark, almost blue-green leaves. I let this beauty scramble up the screened porch stairs and make its way onto the screens. It's true; you may have to tiptoe around to exit from the porch to the outside, a path rarely taken, not because of the sweetie.

Hardy from zone 5 to 8 (some say 9), like other clematis, Clematis terniflora likes cool feet and sunny heads. That means cool roots and sunny foliage for those of you who don't think of plants as having people-parts. I have one happy Sweet Autumn Clematis doing fine in afternoon shade. Mulch generously or shade the roots with a companion plant, such as a low-growing hydrangea. Ruby Slippers Oakleaf Hydrangea (Hydrangea quercifolia) is a favorite that comes to mind.

But there's a negative. Sweet Autumn Clematis is considered invasive by many. She self-seeds readily in some areas. Not in my yard. Maybe because of its location, seeds drop in the lawn area, and therefore, any volunteers are cut down by the mower. However, recently, a client in Essex County has experienced an issue with volunteers over-Clematis has been seen running amok along highways.

A remedy in aremaintained is to prune the clusters of seed heads before they dry and turn brown, typically in early fall, to of seed heads follows, prevent self-seeding.



Then, each year when dormant, cut her down to about a foot above ground to maintain her 20-foot scramble each year. I've even let her scramble as a ground cover with great success. She's listed as Occasionally Severely Damaged by deer, though I haven't had Bambi interfere unless the ambitious nature allows for nibbles to go unnoticed.

Drum roll, please— Let me introduce you to a native look-alike I reBower (Clematis virginiana) blooms mid-tolate summer for about a month. It's often confused with Sweet Autumn Clematis (originating from Asia), but the jagged leaves and lack of fragrance distinguish it from Clematis terniflora, which has rounded leaves.

Despite being fragrance-free, the flowers are highly attractive to many species of native bees and butterflies. Plus, caterpillars of several moths feed on the



Autumn cousin, songbirds nest in the thick vegetation, which is relatively deer-resistant.

Back to my sweet-smelling, vely, despite the invasiveness, there are many fans of my sweetie, including our industry's woody plant guru, Michael Dirr. As written in his Manual of Woody Plants, it's "Probably the easiest clematis to grow as it seems to thrive with neglect." Perfect! Then he adds, "Extremely cently found. Virgin's foliage. Like its Sweet vigorous to the point of App.

viciousness." Uh oh!

There, there, worrywarts, perhaps his location in Georgia has something to do with it. Dirr ends with kudos, saying the "soft fragrance is delightful, and I've allowed the plant to scramble over crape myrtles."

St. Luke's Ambulances Save Lives with Whole Blood

In recent months, St. Luke's ambulances equipped with whole blood have saved numerous lives, including car accident survivors and a gunshot victim.

Whole blood is a powerful, lifesaving tool because, unlike IV fluid. it contains vital components - red blood cells, white blood cells, platelets and plasma, explained Chris Zukowski, MSN, RN, of St. Luke's Emergency and Transport Services (SLETS).

"Communities served by St. Luke's ambu-



are incredibly fortunate, because it is a

lances with whole blood real game-changer for first-responders," he said. "Most other ambulance corps do not have the sophisticated equipment and advanced training to administer whole blood transfusion."

In July 2024, SLETS became one of the region's first ambulance services to carry whole blood on its special critical care transport (CCT) ambulances, initially for the transport of patients between Network hospitals.

But as the recent life-saving examples illustrate, SLETS ambulances in Monroe, Bucks and Lehigh counties are now also using whole blood, when necessary, to save people's lives before they reach the hospital.

This development follows a recent change in Pennsylvania regulations allowing generparamedics—those found on traditional ambulances—to be trained

and certified to administer whole blood. (St. Luke's Dr. Bryan Wilson, who helped draft the new protocol, leads a St. Luke's EMS Physician Response Team that also administers a prehospital whole blood transfusion. See www. slhn.org/blog/2025/ new-state-protocoldrafted-by-sluhn-docsaves-lives.)

"If ambulances don't have whole blood and they respond to a scene, like a horrible accident on I-78, responders can apply a tourniquet and administer IV fluids

 but those measures don't have oxygen-carrying capabilities," Zukowski said. "Providing whole blood at the scene of an accident helps to stabilize patients until we can get them to one of trauma centers."



DEP Plugs Two Actively Leaking Abandoned Wells in Erie County, Supporting the Shapiro Administration's Historic Well Plugging Campaign

Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) began plugging two actively leaking abandoned wells under an emergency contract today in Millcreek Township. Erie, PA. Under Gover-Shapiro's leanor dership, DEP has made historic progress, plugging more than 315 wells throughout the Commonwealth, protecting public health and creating jobs in the process.

The first of the two wells to be plugged sits on the bluff overlooking Baer Beach, directly behind Crystal Point Condos (3300 Baer Rd), which is home to 90 residents. Members of the DEP Oil and Gas program were joined on site by Senator Dan Laughlin and other state leaders and their respective staff, to see the plugging process firsthand and learn about the importance of addressing

dangerous abandoned wells.

"Any time you have an actively leaking well in a residential neighborhood, it is a concern to public health and safety and needs to be evaluated immediately," said DEP Northwest Regional Office Oil and Gas Manager, Scott Dudzic. "Plugging these wells will remove the possibility of methane gas migrating into enclosed structures, causing a potential explosive atmosphere."

Once plugging operations behind Crystal Point Condos has been completed, DEP contractors will mobilize to the site of the second well located at 1602 Linwood Ave. Much like the first, this well has no responsible owner and is actively leaking methane in a residential area. Both well plugging projects are expected to be completed within the upcoming weeks.



Erie County is home to some 3203 active wells and 448 orphan and abandoned wells. DEP is in the process of finalizing a proposed project, through the Department of Interior

(DOI), that will utilize Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) funding to plug 28 wells.

In addition, the Shapiro administration just awarded over \$7 mil-



lion to 35 well plugging projects across the Commonwealth through the Methane Emissions Reduction Program (MERP), focusing on reducing methane emissions,

creating jobs and supporting small business across Pennsylvania. Five of those projects in Erie County will address the plugging of 28 marginal conventional wells.
